Abstract

In this talk I aim to help early career researchers better understand and consider endorsing open-science. I will introduce the current challenges in science and the need for a “credibility revolution”, for us to reflect on, assess, and improve our science practices. I will then outline the main challenges, possible pitfalls, and potential benefits in doing open-science as an early career researcher. Finally, I will briefly cover practical tools and practices that early career researchers can undertake in their own research. I will share some of my own journey and experience regarding open-science, as an early career researcher, and working with our team of over 50 early career researchers.

Biography

Gilad is an assistant professor in the Department of Psychology at the University of Hong Kong. Gilad’s work is in the areas of social-cognitive psychology and judgment and decision-making. Research focuses on the topics of biases and heuristics, especially regarding agency and action. In recent years, with the emergence of the credibility revolution (following the so-called “replication/reproducibility crisis”), Gilad has taken a special interest in the movement for advancing psychological science by giving workshops and seminars and guiding researchers and students about open-science, statistical tools and simulations using open-source software (R), meta-analyses, pre-registrations, replications, and reproducibility.
